



President's Message

Clean-up was once again a very busy day with many members coming in to help. The food was great and everything looks sparkling clean. It did seem that the patio crew had the best time! Starting May 1, we will be firing on Monday, Wednesday, Friday and sometimes on Saturday. Beginning in January the Clay Studio began requiring active members do their 4 hours of service. It has been a very hectic time with members getting trained to do their required Monitoring. We have had calendar issues, crowded times with members getting trained, members not being able to find trainers and a host of other problems. We have trained over 100 new Monitors and the Studio has NEVER had to be closed or not had a Monitor scheduled ahead of time. In the past many people did several monitor shifts a month and often the schedule was empty until minutes before the next shift began. We feel that the new policy has been a good move for the Studio and the general consensus is that it's only fair that everyone helps in the Studio. Diane Willcutt has done a super job of managing all this confusion and getting the job done!

GVR will be installing hepa air filter systems in the studio sometime this summer. This was achieved by a request written by Katy Casey and Jay Groothousen last year. This should help in getting the clay and glaze particles out of the air and making the Studio safer for us. Thanks to Jay and Katy.

The kiln committee reported that the summer firing schedule will start May 1st Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday.

There will be two Raku firings in the month of May. A regular firing on May 1^{st} at 9:00 and a horsehair firing on May 8^{th} at 9:00. You must be present for the firing. Have your pieces in the holding room and enter the patio through the back outside door.

Studio Service

From May 1 to September 31, you may monitor as many shifts as you would like. These shifts will not give you "credits" ahead but we do know that some of you LOVE to monitor. If you are using the studio in a month but cannot do your required shift because of illness or an unforeseen event, YOU must contact the Service Committee at www.gvrclaystudio02@gmail.com and arrange how you will make up your missed service. One Monitor shift= service for the month. If the Service Committee has to contact you it will be considered one of your warnings. Please remember that we are using GVR's 3 strike policy and that after 3 missed service requirements you will not be allowed use of the Studio for 6 months during your time in Green Valley. If you have any questions about the policy please drop us an email at the above address. There are many rumors afloat about the policy so please come to us so you know the facts.



There will be sign-up sheets for anyone who needs to be trained posted on the cupboard doors above the printer. If you want to learn how to monitor, choose one of the days offered and sign up. The training session will only last for three hours or one shift. During the month of May through the end of September, Monitors who love to monitor may sign up to monitor as much as they want.

Glaze Committee Info

The low fire glazes have been rearranged in the hallway leading out to the patio. All samples of pottery using glazes that were at the glazing table are now

on the shelves. In addition, all the Stroke & Coat glazes have been consolidated, as have the Foundations, etc.

The Velvets have also been consolidated on the shelves down to one jar per glaze. All other Velvet jars have been placed in a cabinet, and will only be



put out as the one on the shelf is used up completely. If you need a Velvet and the one jar is not on the shelf, ask around the studio to see if anyone has that one jar at their work area. If there is no glaze, another jar will be pulled out by a

member of the glaze committee.

Some reminders:


- 1. All glazes, including Velvets, Stroke & Coat, as well as all High-Fire glazes, should NOT be taken away from the shelf where it "lives." Put a small amount in either a palette or a 2 oz. cup to take to your work area.
- 2. In addition, never add water to any of the glazes. You can add to your small amount taken to your work area, but then it is contaminated and cannot be returned to the original container -- please throw it out.
- 3. Finally, please do not remove any glazes from the Studio to work at home; glazing should be done in the studio only.


