Board members may serve two three-year terms but are then required to leave the board. I am finishing my second term so I will be done at the end of this year. John Carney is finishing his first term but has chosen not to run again, Marcia Campbell has served as Vice-President for three years and has said she would run again. Mary Clark, Pam Bybee and Tom Healy also agree to run for the Board. So, we had 4

members for 3 positions which is pretty good. Many clubs cannot get members to serve. I then received notice from Dan Swartz, a current board member that he would be leaving the club. Dan has served on the board for almost 5 years and we thank him for his service. The Board agreed that we should offer the rest of Dan's term (until Dec. 31, 2021) to the first person who had agreed to run for a position. That was Mary Clark and she agreed to finish Dan's term. All four of these members will be great additions to the Board....and I must say this: "there will be a peaceful handover of power!" We will be sending out an e-ballot for voting on the Board Members and the by-law approval. By-laws were sent to you in February but I will resend them to you.
